Remembering Debbe Begley

Debbe Begley, *AGR* Co-founder April 26, 1949 – June 18, 2011

Those who have given of themselves to others will live forever in every single heart they have touched. Remembering with you one life that touched so many others.

An innovator, a go-getter, and a champion of Golden Retrievers – this was the kind of gal Debbe was. The quote is from a sympathy card sent to those who knew her best. If you are or have ever been an *AGR* Board member or Team Manager or team participant or answered phones or written thank you letters or attended even a single event of any kind since March 11, 2009, whether you know it or not Debbe touched your heart, as she was behind every activity we did. If you are one of our adopters, whether you




ever met Debbe in person or not, she touched your heart, as you now have a wonderful Golden family member who is as healthy as we could make him or her thanks to Debbe's leadership with fundraising. If you are now a member of *Arizona Golden Rescue*, Debbe had an impact on your life, as the organization would most likely not exist in its present form without her, as she was our Cofounder. We miss her dearly.

Debbe was an Arizona native. Although she did live in Germany for a few years and also in Colorado, she spent most of her life in Arizona. She was married three times, twice to the same man, and during her life she raised six children. I met her when she was again single with only a Golden – **Khakidawg** – for companionship.

I was a member of *Rescue A Golden of Arizona* when I attended a workshop on hiking with your dog at *Thunderbird Mountain Park* on 59th Ave in Glendale. During the workshop, I mentioned my affiliation with *RAGofAZ* and described some of the activities of the Rescue. After the workshop ended, Debbe came running after me in the parking lot and wanted to know much more about the

Rescue. She joined the next day and became very active in the group, eventually becoming what we in *AGR* now call Director of Activities. She was a planner and a doer. Her main goal was to ensure that the organization always had enough money to help every dog that came into our care.

So that we could expand our field of rescue to include Golden mixes, we co-founded *AGR* in March of 2009, and she kept the same goal for this group. After cancer took her in June 2011, we created a special fund to honor her: the *Debbe Begley Memorial Fund*. Each year, we have sponsored dedicated fundraisers (*Paws & Pasta*, now renamed *Dine Out With the Dogs*) to be sure there is always enough money to help dogs who come into Rescue with cancer and to help with vet bills that exceed \$5,000 whether a dog's treatment was for cancer or not. Memorial donations directed to this Fund are always welcome.

Unlike most days at the Rainbow Bridge, this day dawned cold and gray. All the recent arrivals at the Bridge did not know what to think, as they had never seen such a day. In my column, I like to acknowledge members who have gone "above and beyond" what they would normally do. We are fortunate to have such wonderful volunteers!

First, Connie McCabe. Every year, Connie uses her extraordinary graphic arts talent to produce a gorgeous calendar for us. The creation of the calendar requires many, many hours of driving all over the Valley to get really good photos of our adopted dogs, many more hours processing the photos for print publication, even more hours culling through all our event photos to find the best picture of each person who volunteered at least once during the year, and hours of several other people's time to proofread before the calendar goes to the printer. It is amazing that despite how careful the proofreaders are, a couple of small mistakes end up in the proofs! Good thing Connie reviews the entire calendar before giving the print go-ahead. The 44 calendar sponsorships that were purchased by AGR members helped offset the printing cost; these generous members are listed on page 25. Instead of the usual 1000, we purchased only 750 calendars this year because we will not be participating in the usual number of public activities. To be sure you get one, order yours today if you haven't already. Thanks to Connie for such a beautiful job!

Second, **Carolyn Brown**. Carolyn has spent much time organizing our merchandise inventory, especially the microwave bowl cozies, which are our hottest-selling item. She did Mother's Day and Father's Day promotions of this item on our Facebook page, which generated almost \$2,000 in sales. She also arranged for us to have a "Craft Show" outside *Sam's Club* in Surprise (see pages 23-24). We set up all our handmade merchandise and spent 4 hours on each of two Saturdays selling to *Sam's* customers. Our 8 hours of activity outside *Sam's Club* earned us over \$2,300! Thanks to Carolyn for her dedication to fundraising!

Of course, we could not have sold that amount of merchandise if we did not have the merchandise to sell. In the handmade category, we sell the following: bandannas (seasonal and nonseasonal, \$7 each or three for \$20), collar covers in two sizes (\$10 and \$12), checkbook covers (\$5), credit card/business card holders (\$5), face masks (\$10), Kleenex tissue holders (\$5), microwave bowl cozies (\$20/set of two, one 10" and one 12"), pot holders (\$10), oven mitts in three sizes (\$10, \$12, \$15), and purses/totes in several sizes (prices range from \$10 to \$75). Thanks go to **seamstresses** Judy Abell, Denise Padavano, Cindy Tigges, and Connie Wozniak for helping me with the sewing – they are all still sewing so that we can make it through the holidays without going dry in the handmade merchandise category! Our unique items make wonderful gifts and help the Goldens we rescue, so please consider making a purchase from *AGR*. The materials are all donated, so *AGR* gets the entire amount you pay. Thanks to all our talented seamstresses!

Third, Adam Cardinal. If you have tried to access our website during the last five months, you have gotten a message that it is not secure. While that is not accurate, most people cannot get in even if they manage to bypass the security message. Also, if you manage to access the membership and adoption applications and submit them from the website, they will not be forwarded correctly, so it is best to download them from the AGR facebook page or call or write to have those applications sent to you. If you process a donation from the website, it is done through a link to our PayPal account which IS secure. So, there is no way your personal contact information can be compromised by accessing our website. That we are faced with this situation is not our fault. Months ago when the security renewal came due, we paid The Cyber Image for the reactivation of the security certificates, but they never implemented the activation. Despite numerous efforts to contact this company by phone, e-mail and US mail, we have had no luck reaching them - they seem to have vanished. So, we had no choice but to find another company to support our website and database. Adam spent much time interviewing several companies to try to find the one that would be the best fit and be able to do what we need done at a reasonable price, both for the construction and going forward. We chose *Rescuegroups.com*. We were under the impression that they would do all the administration work, i.e. the behind-the-scenes creation of the various pages that need to be on our website. No. In addition to working full time at his paying job, Adam has done most of the work on the new website himself even though it is not his technical bailiwick, which has taken an inordinate amount of time. Thanks to Adam for all his efforts on our behalf.

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From Deb Orwig: The position of Director of Dog Care is still open, so I have written the column article for this issue. Won't one of you please consider volunteering for this job?

In July, I spent some time creating an e-mail list of just AGR adopters, as we were unable to pull that specific information from our database. I sent out a message asking for answers to two questions: (1) Do you still have the dog(s) you adopted from Arizona Golden Rescue, and (2) Have you moved since you adopted the dog?

There are still many who have not responded, so my guess is the list of *AGR* Bridge dogs is even longer than what I have presented on pages 14 - 15, but I have no way of knowing for sure. Some of the responders sent in stories about their dog; most said something like "S/he was the best dog I've ever had!" or "It's been three years since s/he went to the Bridge and I still miss her/him daily." We are sad that all these dogs are no longer with us, but comments like these make our rescue efforts worthwhile.

I received notification that 53 AGR dogs, 12 non-AGR dogs and 6 *AGR* members plus close relatives of two others have all passed away, some during the third quarter of this year, some as long as 5 years ago, with many in between. I want to recognize all the dogs and people we have lost. Due to the number of responses I received, one Bridge page will not work for this issue. In the future, if your *AGR*-adoptee or a member of your family passes away, please try to remember to notify me, as we want to acknowledge your loss, as well as to keep our database as current as possible.

Petco Foundation's Holiday Wishes Contest

In early August, I received a notice from *Petco Foundation* about their upcoming *Holiday Wishes* contest. I read the contest rules, reviewed the winning stories from last year and thought, "We can do this!" Having recently finished creating an e-mail list of *AGR* adopters, I sent the following message to all adopters:

Would you please help *Arizona Golden Rescue* win a Holiday Wishes Grant from *Petco Foundation*? All you have to do is submit a short story about how your adopted dog has changed your life for the better – easy! Every quarter I have received numerous such stories from adopters whose adoption has recently been finalized.

- There is no cost to submit a story.
- The story cannot be more than 500 words.
- The story must be about a living dog or a bonded pair, one per story and one story per household. You will need to mention the current age of your dog.
- Emphasis in the story should be on how the dog has made a difference to you and/or your family (the

change does not have to be extreme) -- share the big and small ways your pet brightens your life.

Here is what *Petco Foundation* said: "We're looking for a diverse range of stories that celebrate the simple ways that pets bring more joy to life, to one-of-a-kind, extraordinary stories. We want all adopters to be able to see themselves in these stories, and animal lovers of all backgrounds to be inspired by the life-changing power of adoption."

In addition to winning-story prizes, *Petco Foundation* will also be awarding cash prizes for the 1st through 5th most submissions! We could win up to \$25,000! Last year's big winner had 50 submissions – with about 800 adopted dogs still living, we could easily beat that! So, submit your story soon!

Responses started dribbling in. By Labor Day, we had only a few entries, so I sent another e-mail to all adopters and the submissions almost doubled. But we were still short of beating the 50 submissions that garnered last year's top-submissions prize. The deadline for contest entries was September 23rd at noon. On the day we would have hosted a golf tournament had we not had to cancel it due to the coronavirus (September 19), I sent out one last plea to AGR adopters. That did it. At 11:33 PM on September 22^{nd} , when the final story was submitted, we confirmed **102** submissions! So many of our adopters came through in wonderful support of Arizona Golden Rescue! We sincerely thank you all and feel that you have given us a good chance at the \$25,000 prize. Some of the adopters who submitted stories sent them to me, as well at to the Holiday Wishes contest. I enjoyed reading every one of them. If any of them win an individual prize award, I hope to publish them in a future newsletter. We will not know until sometime in December if AGR won for most submissions, or if any AGR adopter's story wins a prize. When we are notified, we will have an announcement on our Facebook page and by e-mail.

I would like to thank our Grants Writer Rebecca Mackerman for setting up *AGR* on the *Holiday Wishes* contest site. She had to check the site daily for new entries and confirm that the dogs being written about were *AGR* dogs. The last couple of days before the contest closed, I know she visited the site multiple times to be sure every story was confirmed. Your efforts are greatly appreciated, Rebecca!

One struggles with English as a second language and asked me to review his piece (which I was happy to do) before he submitted it – he writes better than some English-as-first-language individuals! Many are retired, but some juggle a job, family commitments and pets. Quite a few never renewed their membership after the first year or two following adoption, and we had not heard from some of them for years. I am so glad we finally did! You are welcome to rejoin any time.

The story about the dog rescued the longest time ago was Patricia Bower's about **09-038 Bella**. Sarah Martin submitted a story about one of our oldest living dogs, **10-014 Bunny**, now 15; Sharon Ronstadt's **Misty** is now 14; Daisy Barsetti-Nerland wrote about **Hugs**, who is 13; and 13-year-old **19-081 Riley** now lives with Sharon Flores. Patty Mancini wrote about our youngest rescue, **20-021 Sully**, now just 4 months old.

Most of the dogs were owner surrenders, but two were vet surrenders, two were breeder surrenders and six were shelter rescues or found as strays.

Lisa Bartoli, Shannon Biery, and Sheila Joyce wrote about dogs that *AGR* brought to Arizona from China.

I want to thank the three *AGR* members (sorry, I have misplaced their names) who rescued a dog from elsewhere but wanted to submit a story in support of our goal to have the most submissions. According to the contest rules these members were not eligible to enter for *AGR*, but we really appreciate their desire to support us.

First order of business I would like to address is AGR's website – or lack thereof. While upgrading our digital certificate, an essential part of the ability for the general public to interact with us via the internet, our hosting provider experienced some operational problems. After going silent on us for a while, we eventually were informed that they no longer were able to support our organization. We worked to try to migrate our existing website off of their environment but an update from our software provider made all the back-end files inaccessible. We had no choice but to find a new hosting provider who will be able to host our website and our database.

We were told that our website should be relatively straightforward to launch – as long as we made a decision to focus on key functionality and make that our first priority. We did, but the work has still not proceeded anywhere near as quickly as we were led to believe. Part of the problem lies with me – I work full time and my day job has been quite demanding during this period, as well.

The good news is that we have progressed well into the rebuild of much of the informational content of our website, are rapidly working through the design phase, and are about to move into the navigation/user experience phase. We are hopeful to have a new ArizonaGoldenRescue.org website up and running soon. It will be limited to start. Visitors will be able to see dogs in the adoption process; they will be able to apply to become an approved adopter, apply for membership, pay for application and membership fees, and make donations online. All payments will be secure. Future phases will make our photos of events and activities available, host an archive of our newsletters and enable some ability to allow member and adopter information to auto-populate from our forms, reducing data entry work by our volunteers.

It has been a slow, and, at times, frustrating process – for you, our volunteers and supporters, as well as for Deb and me. I wanted to update you on our progress and thank you for your support and your patience!



When the decision was made to focus this newsletter about The Bridge, I was left in a bit of a quandary - not much of what I cover in my articles relates to that difficult and painful part of sharing your life with a dog. We are partial to Goldens here, but the feeling of loss and grief transcends the human-dog relationship. Memories become the thing that supports and enables us the most - and so I thought about memory – not ram chips or hard

drives - but the ability to recall things.

As my years tick up, I've definitely noticed that my memory – both in capacity and in recall speed – has declined. It stinks. I miss what I once had. But I'm also determined to do everything I can to not let it affect my quality of life. I realize that many of you have – and, let's face it, hopefully all of you will – grow older, and experience the losses of what we once had in our youth. For memory there are some tools that can help.

One of the things I love about working with AGR is the cumulative knowledge I can tap into. Whatever I experience in the care of my Goldens – behavioral or physical – I know that other AGRmembers have been through as well. Many share their experience and insight with us for the benefit of all our members. It gives me such confidence that I'm making good choices when thinking about treatment options or just that I'm pursuing a course of action that people I respect see as well-considered and like to be in the best interest of my nuggets – the Goldens who depend on me.

Many of our members have cared for Goldens for decades now, and their experience also spans those decades. Some things we can recall with ease, some we just have to look up. Fortunately we have some amazing record keepers here with our volunteers. They can tell us about a dog now passed who was diagnosed with a condition now affecting one of our member's dogs. They can then share – often in detail – their experience, the pros and cons of what they did, and what they would do differently.

Seeing the value in that collective memory, I have become much more careful about my records. I maintain a history file for each dog, with each vet visit record maintained in historical order. I have now made the decision to keep the records of dogs who have gone over the Bridge, knowing that information could be useful to other members and adopters in the future. If you are inspired to keep your pet records – for your own use in the future or to make accessing them more convenient – this might be a good time to consider a digital solution.

Electronic veterinary health records (or EVHRs) are an option for pet owners. EVHRs give you access to information about past treatments, medications taken, vaccination records - of your current dog or dogs who have been gone for many years. Even with my memory not being what it used to be, I can look up all the details about my dog's history on demand – at home or on the road. I would be able to answer all types of questions:

- Chip number and associated registry
- County License Number
- Rabies Vaccination Date & expiration
- Vaccination history, boosters due
- Date of last blood test
- Prescription medicines & doses

Imagine if you could access your pet's medical, chip and license information from your home computer or even from your smartphone? In a world where we can pay bills on our cell phones and send drones to photograph our vacation from hundreds of feet in the air, these scenarios don't seem that far-fetched.

Vet Record Solutions for Consumers

A new generation of web and mobile applications has been created to make quick and reliable access to pet records a reality for pet owners.

Pawprint, a free EVMR app for your pet, sources official records directly from the vet and provides online access to the pet's vitals.

By bringing all pet care vital records to one place, Pawprint hopes to simplify pet care for owners and veterinarians. The Pawprint app provides a myriad of information, including pet profiles, ID data, past medical treatment records and appointment alerts. The app, with versions for both iOS and Android mobile devices, not only stores digital copies of a pet's official medical records, it also provides alerts when vaccines and checkups are due. The app can also store ID information from a chip implant.

Pawprint is not alone in the pet EVMR space. VitusVet is a cloudbased EVMR app on the Apple App Store and Google Play App Store. VitusVet reports that the app has been downloaded thousands of times on iTunes and has been adopted by veterinarian hospitals in at least nine states.

The primary dividing line between the applications is the amount of data you the pet owner must locate and manually enter in order to populate your pet's health record. Applications like VitusVet are built on the premise that your vet is using an EVMR that is compatible with the core operating system – and that they will support a direct connection between the Vet's system and VitusVet to update veterinary records for all enrolled customers. Pawprint, on the other hand, is the only app which includes a service that will go directly to the vet and get the records for you – all that is required require is your signed permission.

Once you download the Pawprint app and create an account, you make a request for your records. At that point, Pawprint's staff reaches out to your vet on your behalf and retrieves the records "by any means possible," including digital transfer, fax or verbal communication.

The Risk to Early Adopters

At this point there is no "killer application" in the veterinary record space – even if you choose the best mix of price and functionality there is no guarantee that you're backing an iPod, not a Zune. If you take the plunge, ask where the data is stored – is it on your drive or in the clouds. Find out how data, once loaded via typing in the records or importing photos or scans of records and reports, can be extracted out of the system again. If you decide in the future that the first EVMR you selected isn't working for you, there should be an option to move all the records to the new database without having to re-enter the data or re-scan and upload the statements.

Do I Need a Specialized Application?

Absolutely not. Once you have committed to creating the EVMR, you will need to then populate it with relevant records. A key first step will be to start scanning a copy of all your past veterinary service records to store in your application. You will not have the custom fields and data entry methods in place to guide you in establishing an order of presentation, but you will have actual copies of your records stored where you want them – online in a private archive you can access from anywhere in which you can search for just the information you want. You also get to go with the cloud storage solution you are currently using or which you are the most comfortable with. Premiere service providers charge for their service – but you are far less likely to have your data lost or stolen if the business is invested in maintaining their service. Check out Google Docs, Amazon File Cabinet, Apple iCloud, Dropbox, etc.

Ask your veterinarian if he or she could send you treatment reports as PDF files. Title and/or file them by name and type, and it will be easy for you to locate the right day of treatment and type of treatment.

Ultimately it comes down to the services and automation steps you value. If your needs are modest, the secure file share is almost always your best bet. And when the market does choose an EVMR that the majority of tech savvy pet owners adopt, you will be ahead of the game having all of your existing records scanned and indexed.



"It's all about the dogs."

We say that a lot, because that is why we are all part of this wonderful group. You would not be reading this if it were not for your love for the dogs. But as much as that is true, it takes a lot of hard work from a lot of people to keep this organization, and therefore the dogs, alive and thriving.

Meningitis in Dogs

Meningitis, although rare, affects the membranes of the brain and spinal cord (known as meninges). When these meninges become infected by viruses, fungi, bacteria or an auto-immune response occurs, the meninges become inflamed or infected. The infectious type can often lead to death.

This neurological disease inflames these protective membranes, which can cause pain, high temperatures, seizures and paralysis as well. What makes meningitis so dangerous is that it often is misdiagnosed as another illness, resulting in a delay in treatment. Early diagnosis is key to a successful recovery.

Signs of Meningitis in dogs

The symptoms of meningitis vary among dogs. However, it is important to be aware of them in case your pet exhibits these symptoms so you can get your dog to a veterinarian right away.

- Neck or back pain, which would result in stiffness in your dog and not moving around all that much
- Muscle spasms in the neck, back, or legs
- Having trouble when walking
- Your dog's eyes not tracking objects (for example, food, which rivets most dogs' attention)
- Loss of appetite

- Fever, which would require a thermometer for checking
- Vomiting

Causes of Meningitis

Being a disease of the nervous system, meningitis usually originates somewhere else in your pet's body. Usually, your dog might contract an infection elsewhere, which then spreads throughout the body and attacks the meninges. Sources can be bacteria, viruses, parasites, or even fungi (valley fever). Toxins or autoimmune diseases that weaken the dog's natural ability to fight infections can also be the cause, as well.

The most common form of meningitis in dogs is Steroid Responsive Meningitis or SRM. This form is an auto-immune condition in which inflammation occurs in the blood vessels of the meninges. SRM is most often seen in dogs younger than two and dogs of certain breeds: Boxers, Bernese Mountain Dogs, Golden Retrievers, German Shorthaired Pointers and Nova Scotia Duck Tolling Retrievers.

Treatment of Meningitis

Depending on the cause of the meningitis, your veterinary neurologist may prescribe:

- Steroids, which suppresses the immune system so the inflammation will diminish
- Antibiotics if the cause of meningitis originated with an infection
- Antiepileptic drugs if the dog is having seizures
- Intravenous fluids if the dog has not been eating or drinking previously
- Pain medication
- Bed rest and care, as meningitis can zap the energy of dogs as they fight the disease for 4 weeks or so

Diagnosing Meningitis

Diagnosis is usually made with a combination of an MRI and a CSF (cerebral spinal fluid) analysis. An MRI can rule out herniated discs, other orthopedic issues and infectious meningitis. If there is no structural cause, a CSF analysis is done to confirm an anti-inflammatory response or SRM.

Corticosteroids are the treatment of choice for SRM, starting with a daily dose and tapering off over several months. The majority of dogs will begin to show improvement rapidly. However, some dogs will require additional medications to control the inflammatory response.

Meningitis is not a condition that is often seen in dogs but can happen as it has with one of our youngest rescues, **20-023 Ivy**. She is undergoing treatment now for SRM. The most obvious signs are spinal pain, most often located in the neck, and elevated temperatures. Why does a dog get this? Sometimes a young dog's immune system produces inflammation and antibodies against a normal body protein; for SRM, it is a protein in the walls of blood vessels in the meninges.

As always, if your dog stops eating, doesn't want to play or exhibits other irregular habits, see your veterinarian as soon as possible!

Financial Considerations By Deb Orwig

Summer Fundraiser for Special Needs Dogs

In July, all *AGR* adopters received a mailing with a plea for donations to support our 2019-20 Special Needs Dogs, including most of those mentioned in *Diamonds in the Ruff* newsletter columns. Many (87) answered with donations for an incredible total of **\$18,375**!

During the summer, we usually take in more dogs than in any other 3-month period, but we have no significant fundraisers between beginning of April after *Arizona Gives Day* and end of September's golf tournament. Due to the coronavirus, the golf tournament was cancelled; the Meet-and-Greets were cancelled due to the extreme heat and the virus. With a minority of our rescues, the amount of money we need to spend to ensure that the dog is healthy is less than the dog's adoption fee. However, for the majority of dogs we have placed in new forever homes, our costs have been more than the adoption fee, and in some cases thousands of dollars more – the average spent on each of 80 dogs between July 1, 2019 and June 30, 2020 was \$1,865!

We do not for a moment begrudge any amount of money we have spent on improving the health of our rescued dogs. But the money we have spent above and beyond what was covered by the adoption fees has to be recovered by other means, and those means are our fundraisers.

Diamonds in the Ruff By Debbie Ball rlbdlb@cox.net

Diamonds in the Ruff are dogs for which *AGR* has had to spend at least **\$2,000**. Previously we used a \$1,000 threshold for such identification; however, since we know that the average expense for every intake historically is at least \$1,600, we determined that a \$2,000 threshold should be the designation for *Diamonds In The Ruff*. In the third quarter 2020, we had five such dogs. Please consider donating to help with the expenses of a specific dog, or just earmark it for *Diamonds in the Ruff*. All donations are tax deductible, of course, and will be acknowledged both in the newsletter and in a personal letter to the donor.

Diamonds in the Ruff Third Quarter 2020



20-005 Marley/Cooper was a 6-yearold male purebred Golden surrendered by the family of his prior owner who had died. He received his exam, updated leptospirosis vaccines, and bloodwork at *Crosswinds Animal Clinic* in Gilbert. In March, he had X-rays and dental surgery done to remove a fractured tooth and a mass. In spring, he began receiving Apoquel and Cytopoint

injections for chewing his feet and coughing. Then in June, upon being evaluated by *Arizona Vet Oncology*, he was diagnosed with a very vascular lung tumor and his diaphragm was covered with cancer, resulting in surgery for a lung lobectomy. In July, he went home with a temporary chest tube. Unfortunately after further evaluation, it was felt the most humane treatment for this boy was to send him to the Bridge since the cancer was so invasive. **Marley** was adopted by Margaret in Chandler and renamed **Cooper**. Total expenses for *AGR* to date for him were **\$7,306**, but his adopter generously covered all his expenses after the lung lobectomy – we sincerely thank her for that contribution.


20-017 Cooper/Rudder came into Rescue as a young, 10-month-old male purebred Golden who was surrendered by his owner for playing too rough with their older, smaller dog. After his initial exam, updated vaccines, fecal and heartworm test, he was also given a good ear cleaning by *Complete Pet Animal Hospital* in Litchfield Park. In May, he was

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evaluated by *VetMed Emergency & Specialty Care* in Phoenix and found to have bilateral hip dysplasia. In mid-August, he was given a total left hip replacement and is now recovering from his surgery and working on physical therapy. **Cooper** was adopted by Cindy and Robert in Waddell and renamed **Rudder**. This boy loves to swim. It remains to be seen if his right hip might also need surgery, but most likely it will. Third-quarter expenses cost *AGR* **\$6,572**, with total expenses to date so far of **\$7,082**.



20-023 Ivy is a young, 8-month-old female purebred Golden surrendered by her owner who was unable to afford her medical costs. **Ivy** was known to have ectopic ureters, which is a congenital anomaly of the urinary system causing urinary incontinence. This condition is known to be a hereditary problem in Golden Retrievers. She received her initial

vetting and updated vaccines at *Stetson Hills Animal Hospital*. In June, she was evaluated by *Animal Health Institute at Mid-western University* and a cystoscopy and ablation procedure were done to fix her incontinence on the right ureter. In late July after episodes of vomiting, she was again evaluated at *AHI* with an ultrasound and renal chemistry was done. She was found to have some kidney disease from having urinary tract infections (UTIs) her whole life. In August, she suffered high temps and lethargy and was hospitalized again at *AHI*. In September, **Ivy** was evaluated at *AMSC*. An MRI indicated inflammatory meningitis and a cerebral spinal fluid test confirmed. **Ivy** is being fostered by Jay and Abbey in Glendale, and she has bonded with their 3-year-old *AGR* Goldendoodle **Kona**. Total costs so far for **Ivy** have been **\$10,841**.

20-028 Abby was a 10-year-old female purebred Golden surrendered by her owner due to a divorce situation and no time for the dog. She received her initial vetting at *Four-Legged Friends*

Animal Hospital in Phoenix with updated lab work and valley fever testing. A hard spot was found in the stomach area near the spleen and liver, so an ultrasound and splenectomy were done in late July. She was kept on pain medications but continued to have limping and problems with walking. It was found that sarcoma had already invaded her liver and



the difficulty in walking and pain meds made no difference. She went downhill quickly and was unfortunately sent to the Bridge in late August. **Abby** was adopted by Joan in Phoenix. Third quarter costs for **Abby** were **\$4,191**. We thank Joan for her generous donation to help with **Abby's** expenses.

20-032 Ruby is a 3-year-old female purebred Golden surren-



dered by her owner due to illness and inability to afford the costs of a dog who had been sick for almost four weeks. She was evaluated by *AMSC* in Scottsdale due to having evacuation issues with black tarry fecal material. Updated bloodwork and X-rays were done, along with IV fluids, medications, hospitalization, and subsequent updated vaccines. The vet thought

she might have low thyroid, but her T4 bloodwork was found to be normal. **Ruby** was adopted by long-time members Stephanie and Greg. Third-quarter expenses have been **\$2,391** so far, with additional costs expected for a valley fever retest, leptospirosis booster vaccine, and spay surgery.

20-011 Kacey was adopted by Nels in Phoenix on April 23, 2020 but inadvertently got left out of this section in the August issue. **Kacey** is an adorable Goldendoodle and will be a big one, as he was already 55 pounds when surrendered at six months of age by owners who did not have the expertise, time or patience to work with his puppy unruliness. Fortunately for *AGR*, **Kacey** was

already neutered and up to date on all vaccinations. He now has a huge, grassy yard and two Golden playmates to help him burn off his excess energy. New owner Nels has trained several dogs for *Power Paws Assistance Dogs*, so **Kacey** has an experienced trainer/owner now. His behavior has already improved and, given time and maturity, we are sure he will become a wonderful companion dog.

20-013 Maverick is a $2\frac{1}{2}$ -year-old purebred Golden. He was quite hyper, supposedly not socialized, and kept in a crate most of the time because the owner did not have time to train him. They did not have time to take him to a vet, either, so not only did we have to have all his vaccines done, have him tested for valley fever and heartworm, but we also had to have him neutered. Debbie in Litchfield



Park was wanting a companion for her resident dog, **Riley**. She was contacted the day after **Maverick** was transported to her. She said **Maverick** was settling in and he and **Riley** were doing great. She walked him for an hour in the morning with the choker and he pulled like crazy at first, but then slowed down. He's learning the dog door and slept all night in the crate in her room. She put the bones and toys back out but the boys are getting along and she says **Riley** is being great about it. **Riley** seems genuinely happy, and **Maverick** adores **Riley**. After just a week with him Debbie said **Maverick** is doing wonderful, sleeps with her on the bed, is often a couch potato, plays a lot with toys on his own, and likes exploring. He likes the dog door and the yard. She is working

from home now, so she takes him for long walks and trains along the way – he still needs work on pulling but is making progress. She says he is really good with other dogs he meets. She takes **Riley** for separate walks to give him attention and has gone out for an hour or so leaving **Maverick** out of his crate. He has done nothing in the house while alone. She is very happy with him. She knows exercise is the key to getting him settled down. We are so pleased for them all!

20-018 Isabella is an 8-year-old purebred Golden who was being retired by the owner after having been used as a breeder dog. We have no idea how many litters this little girl produced but a guess is at least 7. She needed our entire standard veterinary intake procedure: all vaccinations, heartworm and valley fever tests and to be



spayed. But oops, we did not schedule the latter soon enough, because she went into heat once placed with Christine and Timothy in Prescott, and then exhibited signs of a false pregnancy. Christine reported that Izzie has some funny habits - she squeaks, barks and dances to go out the front door. Then she walks about two blocks and wants to go home. She loves to be in the backyard to chase the lizards. She loves to sit in your lap. About a month after the false pregnancy symptoms subsided (nesting behavior, mammary glands swollen, not real interested in eating, carries stuffed animals around), the vet finally agreed to spay Izzie and discovered a pea-sized mass (not on the uterus) and removed it. Turned out to be something called an ectopic spleen, but we were told it should not cause concern. Christine is one of the 102 adopters who submitted a story for the Petco Foundation's Holiday Wishes contest. She said: I doubt it is a winning story, but hopefully it helps with your goal. Izzie is a winner to us!

20-021 Sully was originally surrendered to one of our participating vets because at 10 weeks of age he was obviously ill. This vet suspected parvo and transferred the dog to *Animal Medical & Surgical Center* in Scottsdale so that the dog could get 24-

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

hour care. Fortunately, the parvo seemed to be a mild case with no intussusception (telescoping intestines) involved. Patty and Mike in Phoenix agreed to foster him through his convalescence. He had all his puppy vaccines and will be neutered when he is a year old. The whole family was enamored with this cute puppy. Patty reported: *Sully* is doing amazing. Sully is now completely well and exhibiting all the normal puppy behaviors. Our wish for him is a long and happy life with this great family!



purebred Golden (at right). The owner's wife left him with four children and two dogs – he was overwhelmed and realized he did not have time to

take proper care of the dogs. He requested that we keep the boys together, so our Placement Team found the perfect match with Cathy and Jim in Cave Creek. Connie, who did the transport, said: What a fantastic transport – made my day! Picked the boys up from in Goodyear and they rode beautifully to Cave Creek. Doug stayed in the back of the van, but **Russell** kept his head at my right arm the whole time. When we got to the FWITAs, it was love at first sight! Jim and Cathy sat on the floor and just loved all over the boys. It was wonderful! Joni (Placement Team) was there with some "Gotcha Day" toys that she bought, and **Doug** immediately commenced to grab everything and run with them. He had both toys and a ball at one time. The boys went outside to explore the yard and we all thought it was cute that **Russell** appeared to be peeing on the sprinkler that had just come on. However, it became clear after a while that he was not still peeing, but was just thoroughly enjoying the "bidet" spray. Smart pup! Doug came with a Frisbee that he loves. Cathy and Jim had lots of toys from their previous dogs and he loves them, too. Carries 3 at a time. Russell prefers to chase **Doug** when **Doug** is chasing toys. He does not really go for them too much himself. Doug seems to be a little possessive of the toys and growls when **Russell** tries to take them. That may be why they didn't have any other than the Frisbee. I was not too concerned, as **Russell** respected **Doug** and did not really try to take toys from him. **Doug** is definitely alpha in that area. I suggested that if it becomes an issue they should remove the toys for a while. Russell constantly worries at the back of Doug's front left leg, especially when **Doug** is chasing toys. We didn't really notice it so much until I was ready to leave – couldn't see anything at a glance, but when I got home could see in some of the photos that behind that leg there was something going on. They intended to get the dewclaw checked when going for their vet visit. [Note: the problem was a cut on his foot.] Terrific placement - these dogs will be totally loved and doted on. The boys had their vaccines updated and were tested for heartworm and valley fever. Russell was fine, but **Doug's** lab results came back with a 1:64 valley fever titer. He was started on fluconazole and his neuter surgery had to wait for 6 weeks until his titer came back 1:16. Russell was neutered right away, but developed an infection, which was treated with an-

tibiotics and cold laser applications. Both dogs are doing well now. Cathy regularly uploads wonderful photos of the boys to her Facebook page and sometimes to *AGR's*. Since *Petco Foundation* allowed stories about pairs,

20-027 Jack, a 5-year-old purebred Golden, was originally owned by the grandfather in the family, but he passed away. Care of the grandmother and the dog fell to the granddaughter, and she just could not manage both, so she surrendered the dog to us. Bone Broth is a Nutrient-Dense Meal Supplement or Treat

Note from Deb Orwig: When I became concerned about how little water **Dallas** drinks, I found the following article from Healthy Pets by Dr. Karen Becker. **Dallas** loves this liquid made from beef bones and will drink all I give him, so I have to limit the amount. At least he is drinking now. The liquid helps his bowels to function better and he has less of a struggle to empty them because the feces is softer. If your dog has any kind of gastrointestinal distress, you might want to try this, but check with your vet first.

Bone broth is an excellent bioavailable source of vitamins, minerals and nitrogen, with potent healing properties. It can help relieve joint and stomach pain and supports the immune system. Bone broth is also a great after-fasting food for animals recovering from gastrointestinal (GI) irritation or illness. If you have a finicky pet, you can use it as a topper on food. If you have an older pet with a declining appetite, feeding bone broth provides very concentrated nourishment and helps keep the GI tract functioning.

Bone broth is inexpensive to make, easy to prepare and, best of all, incredibly nutritious. When you simmer bones in water overnight (or longer), it allows all the minerals and marrow to leach out into the water, providing your pet with a variety of nutrients in an easily absorbable form, including:

- calcium, phosphorus and other minerals, which are components of collagen and cartilage
- silicon and other trace minerals, which are components of bone and bone marrow
- glucosamine and chondroitin sulfate, the "conditionally essential" amino acids proline, glycine and glutamine

The boiled down cartilage and collagen in the broth are excellent for animals with achy joints and may help reduce joint pain and inflammation. Cartilage is also known to support immune system health, while the amino acids in bone broth (such as glycine, proline and arginine) fight inflammation. The minerals in the broth help support bone health, as does the collagen. The gelatin in bone broth may also support muscle growth, making it useful for athletic as well as elderly pets. Bone broth is also easy to digest and provides excellent support for the gastrointestinal tract. In fact, bone broth provides a highly concentrated source of nutrition for pets that have recently been sick, are elderly, or have become finicky eaters.

It is not a balanced diet, but it works well for a snack or for pets who are refusing to eat. You can also add the broth to your dog's or cat's regular meals for added flavor, moisture and nutrition. Freeze it in ice cube trays to make a perfect summer cool-down treat. It will even help your pet detox from the environmental pollutants s/he encounters on a daily basis. As noted in *Dogs Naturally* magazine:

"The liver is the master organ of detoxification. The dog's liver is under assault daily as the poor dog lies on carpets and floors treated with chemicals, walks on grass that's been treated and sprayed with poisons, consumes foods with toxic and synthetic ingredients, and suffers through toxic dewormers, flea and tick preventives, drugs, antibiotics, vaccines and more. The liver was never meant to suffer this onslaught and its capacity to detoxify is limited by the availability of the amino acid glycine. Guess what has tons of glycine? Bone broth!"

How to Make Your Own Bone Broth

Start with the highest quality ingredients you can find, including organic, pastured chicken, beef, or bones. You can use a whole organic chicken (pets will enjoy the meat, too) or look for organic beef thigh bones (soup bones).

Fill your pot with pure water and add the bones plus a splash of organic apple cider vinegar. Acetic acid (vinegar) helps leech the minerals from the bones into the stockpot water. Let the mixture simmer on the stove for up to 4.5 hours, until the meat is falling off the bone and you can remove it (and any skin and fat) from the pot.

Return the broth (including the bones) to the stove, add another splash of vinegar, and continue simmering for another 24 hours to be sure all the nutrition is pulled from the bones. After 24 hours, run the broth through a strainer to remove the cooked bones and bone fragments. You can either discard these or run them through a food processor and add them back into the broth.

With very little effort on your part, you'll have a superfood that will provide your pet with comfort and nutrition year-round (and as a bonus, you can eat it, too)! You can pour some broth into an ice cube tray, freeze it, and offer your dog bone broth popsicles as a delicious, nutritious treat.

Bone broth is also very low in histamines, which may help dogs with allergy-like symptoms.



Carrot Oat Yapplesauce Treats Ingredients

1/2 cup Quick Oats 1/2 cup Unsweetened Applesauce 1/2 cup (about 1 large) Carrot, finely grated 1/2 cup All-purpose Flour

Instructions

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees and cover a baking tray with parchment paper.

2. Mix all four ingredients in a medium dog bowl.
3. Spoon onto baking tray in bite size shapes.
4. Bake and bark for 18-20 minutes.

5. Engage puppy-dog eyes until properly treated.

Pup-Kin Carrot Bites

Ingredients

3/4 cup canned plain pumpkin (ONLY pumpkin) 1 Egg, slightly beaten 1/4 cup shredded Carrot 1 cup Whole Wheat Flour

Instructions

 Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
 Stir all four ingredients in a large dog bowl until mushy.
 Roll the batter into small balls and place on a baking sheet.
 Bake and bark for 30-35 minutes.
 Commence begging.

Sweet Pup-Tato Chews Ingredients

2 Sweet Potatoes

Instructions

1. Preheat oven to 250 degrees.

2. Slice washed sweet potatoes lengthwise about 1/4-inch thick. Place on baking sheet.

3. Bake and bark for 3 hours. Turn slices about halfway through barking.

4. Cool on wire racks after barking.

5. Jump on the counter and enjoy!

Furozen Blueberry Coconut Oil Treats

Ingredients

Small Silicone Mold 1/2 cup Coconut Oil in solid form Frozen Blueberries

Instructions

1. Place a frozen blueberry into each opening in the silicone mold. Set aside.



All international rescue efforts have been suspended until further notice due to the coronavirus situation. We have taken in very few dogs from Arizona in 2020 – only 32 as of this writing. So, we look forward to bringing some Goldens in from China, South Korea and/or Turkey in 2021. If you are interested in adopting a Golden from out-of-country, submit an application <u>now</u> if you are not already on our approved-toadopt list. Also, anyone interested – already-approved or not – please let me know your preference for gender and age as soon as possible. We have not worked with a Turkey or South Korea rescue yet (although other US-based Golden Retriever rescue groups have), so we don't know if we can specify age and gender, but we do know we can do that with our China contact.

Facebook Donations By Deb Orwig

If you make a donation to AGR on our Facebook page, Facebook generously covers the administration cost. So, your entire donation is received by AGR without 4% or 5.2% or some other amount being subtracted. It usually takes two weeks for donations to be confirmed in our checking account.
