
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2014 Spring Break-out!



Our mom told us that the theme for this issue is "looking ahead", but being contrary as we sometimes are, we would like take a look back briefly. We had such a fabulous time during the holidays! All that meeting and greeting at the various events we attended was so much fun – people petting us, loving on us, giving us treats and putting money in our Donation Vests to help new rescues – what could be better than that? We met a lot of new canine friends, too, especially at the Tempe Marketplace *Barnes & Noble* gift wrap event. During the day, 54 canines brought 91 humans to help at our gift wrapping tables or just to take us for walks throughout the mall area. **Duffy** was even reunited with both of his brothers over the holidays. **Murphy** came to Tempe Marketplace with his housemate **Gus** and his human mom and dad, and **Barklay** came to visit us at our home for a week over Christmas. It was great fun for all of us, but especially for **Duffy**.

Now, looking ahead... There are two terrific events coming up that we hope you will attend. First is the *Parada Del Sol*, which is on Valentine's Day this year, so our theme for the Parade is "Goldens Are All Heart!" Our mom is making bandannas from Valentine's fabric for all the dogs who come, so be sure to let her know if you can attend. The parade route is different from that in previous years, going from north at Drinkwater Blvd. Camelback Rd, then south on Scottsdale Rd to Indian School Rd, then east and north again to Brown St where the Trails End event takes place and where we will have a booth. The route is shorter than the south-to-north route they have used in the past, only about 1½ miles. So get your walking shoes on and start practicing your prance!

The other great event is our Annual Meeting with BBQ lunch, *Paws At The Park*. This year is an east-side year, so we will be at *Papago Park*, Tempe (corner of College Ave/Curry Rd, just west of Scottsdale Rd north of the 202 freeway). Our thanks to Jackie and Dave Engelhardt for securing the park for us and paying the reservation fee in memory of their rescued girl **Sage**, who went to the Bridge in December. The date is **Sunday, March 15**, and the event goes from **11 AM to 3 PM**. For \$8 each, you get a full

lunch – hamburgers or hotdogs, beans, coleslaw, chips, dessert and beverage. We will have a raffle, and all our merchandise will be available for purchase. There will be a Rainbow Bridge ceremony to acknowledge dogs that have passed away, a ceremony to recognize dogs that have been adopted since March 2014, and a Parade of Rescue that we can all participate in. In past years, over 100 dogs have attended this event with their families. We hope you can come this year! Please fill out the enclosed registration form and send it in no later than March 7<sup>th</sup>. You can also register online. We need an accurate count of potential attendees, so that we can be sure to have enough food for everyone.

# Wags and Woofs By Deb Orwig, President

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After our best-ever holiday season, we are on to new things. There is no weekend before the end of March when we are not scheduled for something, and on many of those weekends both Saturday and Sunday are booked with an event. Please consider attending at least once. We have proven time and again that the more dogs we have with us at an event, the more donations we get. If you do not have a name tag, let me know at least a week ahead of an event you plan to attend and I will be sure to make one for you – we like the public to know with whom they are speaking when they ask questions about our organization and also that you are a *bona fide* representative of *Arizona Golden Rescue*.

The AGR Board members have voted to change the title of the Director's position that has been vacant for almost a year. Director of Operations seemed to be an intimidating title for someone to assume, as it implied (to some) work that was far beyond the actual scope of the job. The new title is Director of Activities. It is really the same job it has always been, but we are hoping that this is a more "user-friendly" title. The position involves the scheduling of events, which are usually fundraisers, seeing to it that every event has a chairman, and overseeing the events to be sure they get done. The Director of Activities is not obligated to attend each and every event, nor is there an obligation to chair any in particular, although the *Director* may opt to to do that. During any month, at least one inquiry will come in from some group trying to get AGR to attend an event. It will be up to the Director of Activities to decide (with Board input) if AGR is going to participate and, if so, to secure the details, make sure the event organizers have the proper paperwork and sometimes a fee from us, and then inform the membership by asking Dana Haywood to release a message about the event. The Director of Activities will be encouraged to come up with new fundraising events, as well. The Director of Activities will also be responsible for writing a quarterly column for this newsletter and making sure that anyone who chairs an event submits their event write-ups and photos, too. Board meeting attendance would be mandatory. However, we schedule these meetings only 4-6 times a year and at a time that is convenient for all – we usually do a dinner meeting at one of our homes on a week night.

It is not a difficult job – for almost a year, I have been doing it as well as several other jobs (President, Newsletter Editor, and Merchandise Manager; I also do home evaluations and transports). But I am tired, and I would like to hand this job over to someone else. Will you please consider it?

I have had several inquiries about a *Casino Night* event for 2015. As of now, none is scheduled. In October 2014, I made the initial inquiries about rental fees for the facility and the games. I was informed that although *Arizona Nights* would charge us the same fee for the games as in 2014, the *Fresh From The Kitchen* facility fee would be double what we paid per person and we would have to guarantee an attendance of 75 (we had only 62 attend last year). Since we would have to raise the price of admission and reduce the amount of chips given with the registration fee in order to end up with similar profit, we made the decision not to do it. If anyone knows of a reasonable-size facility in a fairly central location that would not charge us a rental fee (or only a nominal one) and where we might bring in our own food (to keep the event cost down), please contact me.

If anyone has any ideas for another fairly major fundraiser (we cleared almost \$6,000 last year with our *Mardi Gras Casino*), please contact me.

#### Paws Forward

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#### Looking Ahead

Organizations, like businesses – and careers – will not be successful unless we know where we are going and how we want to get there. *AGR* is no exception.

In order to see where we want to go, we need to look at where we have been. Incorporating in 2009, **AGR** was organized around the principle of wanting to help all Golden Retrievers and Golden mixes that come into our care and find them the best forever homes. While it sounds like a relatively simple task, to be done well, it is not. It takes understanding what we can about the incoming dog, learning what we can about the applicants and their families, and making the best match of the two. **AGR** is about getting available dogs, having good veterinary care and making good

matches between home and hound.

Unlike other Golden Retriever Rescues operating in the state, we do take mixes, including some that appear to be in "witness protection" but truly show a Golden heart. As a result, we have occasionally guessed wrong, especially with puppies. Taking mixes means that, among others, we accept Goldendoodles, which are varying percentages of Golden Retriever and Poodle. Even when we think we are taking in a purebred Golden, we have been surprised. There is a delightful story of what appeared to be a purebred Golden identified while lying in a kennel at a shelter. When someone went to pick him up, they learned that he didn't stand up very far, as his legs were only about eight inches long. Hmmm, some Bassett or Corgi, perchance? We have had at least two of these height-challenged "Goldens", and they have made loving additions to their families. Another example is a dog we rescued from a reservation down south. She looked like others of the Golden/Border Collie-type mix that we had rescued in the past. Out of curiosity, her adopter recently had her DNA tested. Turns out, she does not have a drop of Golden blood in her! Who knew? We certainly did not, but she now has a terrific and safe home and will never again be used for target practice. (Yes, the vet found a shotgun bullet inside the dog and removed it when he spayed her; the dog now wears the bullet as a collar decoration.)

We also have partnered with out-of-state rescue groups to bring in dogs from areas that have more dogs than adopters. This practice can be continued and possibly expanded.

Needed during the next five years are more veterinarians on board to work with us. We especially need practices in the more geographically remote areas, so FWITAs will not have to travel great distances to get the vetting completed. We need to identify vets that someone trusts with their own dogs and who are willing to work with us with possible discounts. With any luck, we will be bringing in new business for these vets, as adopters have a positive experience with them and they are in their neighborhood.

AGR has an excellent selling point: we pay our bills promptly, and we can and will provide referrals to our current vets for confirmation. Several of our vets bill us once a month; others keep our credit card on file and automatically charge it any time an AGR foster dog comes into their practice. If necessary, we will pay for a dog's treatment when the dog leaves the clinic, just as a private citizen would be expected to do. This is not the case with all Rescues, which makes it harder for those who are more fiscally responsible.

Finding excellent homes that can meet a specific dog's needs is a tricky operation. Just as all dogs do not meet everyone's needs, all homes, while they can be good ones, are not right for every dog. Key to learning about a prospective home is the home evaluation process. Home Evaluators are the people who go to an applicant's home to meet the family, see the home and get a sense of what

type of dog would fit best.

For instance, a frail person would not be a good match for an exuberant young dog, but some people request just what they probably should not have. Some dogs need quiet, so placing them in a young family with high-energy children would not be good for the dog. From just the online applications, we cannot discern these attributes.

We have a number of excellent Home Evaluators currently providing appropriate feedback so that the Placement Team has a good picture of a prospective family. What we have not always had is consistency. We need an accurate picture of the family and the home. To help attain the needed consistency, we are currently developing a Handbook for Home Evaluators. Over the next year we will be conducting training sessions so everyone evaluates the same thing in the same way. These process improvements will also make it easier to bring more people on board, as Evaluators are needed especially in outlying parts of our ever-expanding Metro area.

Hopefully, those of you reading this column can see a place where you can help us continue our mission. Come join us. You have gotten a new friend from us; help us get the next dog and family together.

#### The Information Highway

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The first five years of Arizona Golden Rescue's existence have been marked by growth and change. We have come so far in the way we do things, from everything being done by downloading a form and mailing it in to filling it out online and submitting it. We have also created different options for online payment.

What is forecast for the next five years? As far as the IT portion of our operation, we have to be very diligent with the security of everything we do online. We have had a firewall on our website and database for several years and are always updating it; that will continue into the future. We have the responsibility to keep everyone's information safe. We are always changing the website in response to new advances in technology and also to suit our needs.

Besides handling the IT portion of our organization, I am the Transport Manager and also host several Meet-and-Greets every month. In the beginning of our organization, we had a definite group of members that we could count on for every event and need of the group. Over the last five years, for one reason or another we have lost some of this help. Some members have had to stop because of health reasons, while others have moved away.

We who remain active are aging, and we sometimes find we are hard-pressed to keep up with the everyday demands of the organization. We need help from some of the new members who have adopted a dog and joined our group. Besides help for set-ups and manning of events, we also need fresh ideas for fundraising. We could repeat the same events each year, but they may become boring or exceed the range of the budget we have to allocate for them while allowing the cost to remain reasonable.

No matter what happens to those of us who take care of the every-day activities of the group, *AGR* needs to be prepared to continue, as there will always be Goldens out there who will need saving. We need individuals ready to step in and help. This can be as simple as attending a Meet-and-Greet, or more involved as in volunteering to take a position of responsibility within the organization.



There are also other ways that you can support the organization even if you are unable

to take part in many events. **GoodShop** is spotlighting **Arizona Golden Rescue**; you will see their new logo on our website. For those of you who shop online, you can go through our link to almost any store that you already shop in online, but by going through **GoodShop**, **AGR** will get a percentage of your purchase without it costing you anything extra. You can also find coupons for many of these stores that you would not get by going to the particular stores without going through **GoodShop**. **Goodshop** is a win-win situation – a win for you with the coupons you may get, and a win for **AGR** with a percentage of the sale.

Another great program that provides money for *AGR* without any work from us is the *Fry's Community Partners* program. If you shop at a *Fry's* store (*Fry's Food & Drug, Fry's Marketplace, Fry's Signature*) you can link your VIP card to *AGR* and quarterly we get a check from *Fry's*. This does <u>not</u> affect your VIP Points or gas rewards, but it sure helps



AGR. During the last quarter before the new sign-up period, 109 families were supporting us through this program. Unfortunately, we now have only about 80 families, primarily because everyone needed to re-sign up last September and many did not. The last check we received from Fry's before they asked people to re-register was for \$826.18. The 2014-2015 first-quarter check we recently received was for \$762.70, still a very nice amount, but we can do better. We would greatly appreciate it if everyone would renew, and if you are one of our many new adopters you will link your VIP Cards to AGR. Once you have signed up – it will literally take only a minute of your time – please ask your friends, neighbors and co-workers to sign up, too. There is no program requirement for the VIP card holder to be an AGR member. Instructions for sign-up are on the home page of our website.

Let's meet Cara Holland and Jack Craven who share number 32F



Cara was born on June 15, 1957, and grew up mostly in Denver, CO, with her younger brother and three older sisters. Her dad was a college professor and her mom a PhD candidate. Both parents emphasized critical thinking. There was no TV while she was growing up so they had to talk to each other, especially about current events and books. Her brother had some develop-

mental delays and sought the companionship of dogs instead of people. His favorite breed was the Golden Retriever, so they had a Golden/Coonhound mix and a Golden/Great Pyrenees. The dogs saved her brother's life – they were his only real friends and Cara has never forgotten that.

Jack was born in Pittsburgh on June 15th, 1953, and grew up in Bradford, PA, with a brother and sister. His dad had served in the Navy in WWII and then worked for the IRS for 10 years. After that he joined Zippo manufacturing and lived in Bradford for 25 years. After retiring, Jack's parents moved to Arizona in 1982 to be near his sister and family. His dad passed away in 1992, but his mother remained strong and active until she passed away last year at the age of 97.

Cara played sports in middle school and high school (softball, basketball, track, judo) and was one of the first women in the Colorado region to achieve a high level in judo. In high school she was trained by a Japanese judo champion who only spoke Japanese. So, she was forced to learn a little of the Japanese language, like "I need to go to the bathroom and if you don't let me off the mat, it will not be pretty" and other expressions of necessity. Majoring in Japanese and Japanese History at *Duke*, she graduated *cum laude* in 1980. For 3 years, Cara got to spend 6 weeks each summer in Japan as part of the Japan-America Student Conference. She then went to graduate school at the *University of Denver* and graduated first in her class in 1983 to receive her MBA with emphasis in statistics and operations research.

Jack was also athetic growing up. He played both football and basketball in high school, in addition to running track. Unfortunately, he broke his wrist during gym class in his junior year and had to forego both football and basketball for the rest of the year. So, Jack put more emphasis on track and worked hard on getting in shape. During his senior year, he was All-District in football and the Pennsylvania State AA champion in the 220-yard dash. After high school, Jack applied to the *United States Military Academy* at West Point, NY, and received an appointment to the Class of 1975. While there, he was a member of the varsity track team for the entire four years and captain of the Indoor and Outdoor teams his senior year. He was commissioned as an infantry officer, and after graduating from the Infantry Officer's Basic Course and both the U.S. Army Airborne and Ranger Schools, began his first assignment at Ft. Lewis, WA, with the 9th Infantry Division. He served four years at Ft. Lewis, then decided to leave the service in 1980 after five years of active duty. It was a tough decision after nine years of military life, but he has never looked back. Later on, he served another four years in the Army Reserves.

Jack and Cara's paths crossed when she went to work for *Citicorp* in Denver, running their credit analysis department. She was promoted to VP soon thereafter, becoming one of the youngest VP's at *Citicorp*. Just for fun, she also taught statistics at a local uni-

versity. They met when Jack joined *Citicorp* in 1984 after getting his MBA. In 1986 he went to work for *Bank of America* in California and they began a long distance relationship, which kept the airlines in business until he returned to Denver in 1989. In 1991 they were both hired by the *First Bank System* (now *USBank*) in MN and were married there in 1992, but only after Jack agreed to learn the game of hockey, which Cara loved. In 1997, Cara went out on her own as a consultant in the same area that she worked in at the bank – process design/efficiency – plus she managed many enterprise-wide projects for a variety of clients.

They lived in MN for seven years and then came to Paradise Valley, where Jack headed up a newly minted, NASDAQ-listed company for two years. It was there in 2000 that **Carmen** came into their lives from **RAGofAZ**, along with Aunt Connie and Uncle Nick, who had been fostering her for many months and had given up hope that she would ever be adopted. **Carmen** could leap 6-foot walls with ease, and didn't hesitate to jump through windows if she wanted to be on the other side. That did not scare off Jack and Cara, who embraced the challenge and somehow managed to keep her safe no matter where they lived. **Carmen** is Jack's first pet ever. What she has meant to him is not easy for him to put into words, but she definitely changed their lives. She will be 16 in June, and we will celebrate her birthday on the same birthdate that Jack, Cara and Aunt Connie all share, June 15.

At one point, Jack and Cara decided to move back east. There, Jack joined *Textron*, a large conglomerate headquartered in RI, and Cara continued with her successful consulting career. Later on, an offer for Jack to become COO of a growing mid-west bank in Ohio looked attractive, and they moved there in 2004. However, they really missed Phoenix, so they returned here in 2006. Jack joined a fast-growing company in the financial services industry that grew from 30 to 230 employees in the time he was there until the owner decided to retire and close the company. After that, he became the Managing Director for Strategic Services for a banking consulting firm in Scottsdale. He did not relish all of the travel, so he decided to do something different. Now Jack is running a medical communications company. Cara has curtailed her client work significantly and will retire "officially" in 2015.

Since adopting Carmen, they have also adopted four Rottweillers, three of which have passed away. Cara suffered a lot of injuries from a motorcycle accident and has given up riding a Harley but keeps busy doing volunteer work for *Rotten Rottie Rescue* and *Arizona Golden Rescue*. She and Jack support, attend and volunteer for the Golf Tournament, Santa Photos and other events. Cara also does volunteer work with seniors through a local non-profit agency called *Duet*. They serve homebound individuals free of charge (mostly seniors) – take them to medical appointments, take them out, do grocery shopping for them, etc. Cara definitely plans on keeping her brain active by continuing to participate in online and onsite Oxford courses. She plans to travel for sure, volunteer

for rescue groups, and keep **Carmen** in the manner to which she has become accustomed – completely and utterly spoiled! – and to watch a lot of hockey! Cara believes that there is no failure in doing, just failure in not trying, AND that worry is wasteful – take a nap instead. After retiring someday, Jack will play more golf and read more military history, especially about the American Revolution and George Washington.

Judy keeps very busy on the Intake team, carefully interviewing and counseling people who want to surrender their dogs and making sure that we get all of the information possible. She also participates in eastside Meetand-Greets and other events.

In Judy's own words, Born in Cleveland, Ohio, one thing you learn is loyalty. How else can you explain that I'm still a die-hard

Cleveland Browns fan after suffering through all these years? My brother had moved to Arizona many years before my sister and I came out to visit in February of 1980. Well, needless to say it was 80 degrees and we were heading back to a blizzard. We decided then and there to move to Arizona as soon as possible. So in 1981 we packed up the family – husband (no longer), daughter, sister and two Irish Setters. I went to work for Motorola and recently retired after 30 years of service.

One Christmas several years ago, Bill and Linda Atkinson passed by a *Barnes & Noble* gift wrapping event and that was the beginning of a many-year love affair with *Arizona Golden Res*-



cue. They have since rescued two Goldens, Sam and Thunder (in photo). With AGR, they have volunteered and attended many parades and events.

#### Health and Safety

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#### Lumps and Bumps: No problem, or very big problem?

Most dogs, including Goldens, get lumps as they age, but younger dogs are not an exception. Most of these lumps are benign cysts, lipomas (fatty tumors) or granulomas, but some are much more serious. It is recommended that a new mass, or one that has suddenly changed in size, be evaluated by a vet and, if deemed necessary, a needle aspiration should be performed to determine the type of cells present.

There are benign masses that should be removed before they lead to ulcerations of the skin or interfere with sight or movement: warts, follicular or sebaceous cysts, benign histiocytomas (often found on young dogs), sebaceous adenomas if they are ulcerated, large lipomas and basal cell tumors that can become malignant.<sup>1</sup>

One lump that looks like many of the ones just mentioned is a malignant tumor which can be treated quickly and without long-lasting issues if found early. However, left to grow and spread it can affect internal organs and lead to death. These are mast cell tumors. They are one of the most common skin tumors in dogs and often look like harmless cysts, histiocytomas or lick granulomas.

According to the *National Canine Cancer Foundation*, mast cells are cells that occur in the skin and other tissues, like the intestines and respiratory tract. They are also an integral part of the

immune system. They consist of large amounts of histamine, heparin, and proteolytic enzymes (enzymes which break down protein). These have a toxic effect on foreign invaders, like parasites, and are released when the mast cell is triggered by the immune system. A mast cell tumor results from these mast cells. When histamine, heparin, and enzymes are damaged by some external invasion, they pose health hazards. Large amounts of these substances are released into the body and usually have adverse effects on heart rate, blood pressure, and other body functions.

Several *AGR* members have had dogs with mast cell tumors and, fortunately, have been able to catch them early and have them removed. Mast cell tumors can return, so vigilance is necessary for any new lump. Unfortunately, a dog surrendered to *AGR* in December had large, untreated mast cell tumors that were beyond anyone's treatment capabilities. The dog had to be euthanized.

According to *North Carolina State University College of Veterinary Medicine*, treatments for mast cell tumors that are beyond minimally invasive (tumors) involve *Diagnostic tests... recommended to ensure there is no obvious evidence of spread to other places in the body. These tests include:* 

- Complete blood count (CBC)
- Serum biochemistry panel
- Urinalysis (U/A)
- Lymph node aspiration cytology
- Abdominal sonogram

If metastasis has occurred, current protocol involves a combination of prednisone, vinblastine, and CCNU, the three drugs with demonstrated effectiveness against mast cell tumors. Chemotherapy can also be used alone if surgery and radiation therapy are not performed.

Sad but true is this statement from an article by Rhonda Hovan in Understanding Cancer in Golden Retrievers<sup>2</sup>: Let's get started with some data of how cancer affects our breed. Approximately 60% of all Goldens will die from cancer. By gender, it's 57% of females and 66% of males. Human cancer is also skewed slightly toward males, so it's not surprising that dogs are too. For comparison, the rate of cancer in Goldens is just slightly less than double the rate of cancer in all dogs, which is estimated to be about one in three (and which actually is about the same as in humans). But even though our cancer rate is nearly double the all-breed average, it's important to keep in mind that the average lifespan of the breed is still within the same 10-11-year range as in all breeds.

While the above information may seem disheartening, many Goldens live long, healthy lives only surrendering to illness (yes, often cancer) in their old age. It is when cancer hits young dogs in the prime of their lives that we ask, why is this happening? And it is why it is important to always check over your dog for lumps,

bumps or any small injury that might not be healing quickly and get them evaluated by a vet.

#### **Papillomatosis**

The term papillomatosis is used to describe a benign tumor on the surface of the skin. A virus, known as the papillomavirus, causes the growth. The general appearance is wart-like, raised, with the central surface having an open pore if the wart is inverted.

#### Sebaceous Cysts

Sebaceous cysts are common surface tumors found anywhere on the body. These cysts begin when dry secretions block hair follicles, causing an accumulation of hair and sebum (a cheesy material), and the subsequent formation of a cyst.

#### Lipomas

A lipoma is a benign growth made up of mature fat cells interlaced with fibrous connective tissue. Lipomas are common in overweight dogs, especially females. A lipoma can be recognized by its oblong or round appearance and smooth, soft, fatlike consistency.

#### Histiocytomas

Histiocytomas are rapidly growing tumors found in dogs 1 to 3 years of age. They occur anywhere on the body. These benign tumors are dome-shaped, raised, hairless surface growths that are not painful.

#### Sebaceous Adenomas

Sebaceous adenomas arise from the oil-producing sebaceous glands in the skin. They are not dangerous.

#### Basal Cell Tumors

This is a common tumor usually found on the head and neck in dogs over 7 years of age. It appears as a firm, solitary nodule with distinct borders that set it apart from the surrounding skin.

## Service Paws By Wendy Enos

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In the November issue, you joined me in saying goodbye to my service dog, **Sophie**, who passed away in August. Now, allow me to introduce you to **Cubby**. **Cubby** and I have been in training together as a team since February 2014. We are out of the classroom now and, as soon as he passes his public access test, we will be out in public together, gaining experience leading up to his certification test. He is one awesome dog!

#### Fake Service Dogs

It happens thousands of times every day in the U.S. People sneak their pet dogs into restaurants, stores, airplanes, and other businesses with the simple phrase, "He's my service dog." According to the United States Department of Justice, the only inquiries a manager or employee may make are, "Is this dog required because of a disability?" and "What is the dog trained to do for you?" No proof of training or certification, and no vest, harness, or ID tag is required.

It is a federal crime to fraudulently pose as a person with a disability or to pass off one's untrained pet as a service dog. So why do people do it? Because they can.

You, the public, have little choice other than to accept a dog as a service dog, because you are not allowed to demand proof. So how can you know which is a genuine service dog and which is not? Simply, you can't – not until the laws are changed, and I don't see that happening anytime in the near future.

So here is what you can do: be cautious about pre-judging. Many disabilities are invisible, so just because you cannot see a person's need for a service dog does not mean there isn't one. Pay zero attention to anyone flashing ID cards, badges, tags, national registry papers (there's no such thing as a national service dog registry) and fancy apparel. Anyone can get any of these things over the Internet; there are literally thousands of unscrupulous suppliers, so the presence or absence of those items does not tell you a thing.

You may exclude the "emotional support" or "comfort" animals; they don't have the same public access rights as mobility, guide, alert, or hearing dogs. Providing emotional support or keeping a person calm is something they do naturally, so a dog does not meet the criteria for a service dog unless it has also been individually trained to perform actual tasks to mitigate the person's disability.

In 2011, the law changed to permit only dogs and, in some cases, miniature horses as service animals; therefore, you may refuse access to someone with a "service" cat, bird, iguana, hamster, pig

... the list goes on ...

Legitimate service dog handlers generally will not take offense, raise their voices, curse at you, or spout all their legal rights when you ask them the questions you are allowed to ask. That is more the speed of someone with something to hide.

Your best bet is to pay attention to the dog's behavior. You are allowed to exclude any dog who barks, lunges, threatens, or fails to be brought under the immediate control of the handler. You may also have the dog removed if it is not housebroken. If you believe a dog may be a fake service dog, keep an eye on it. If it is well-behaved and under control, then you may have no choice but to just let it go. It is better than making life that much harder for handlers of real service dogs.

A few major organizations are making urgent attempts to get the laws changed but, until that happens, it is better to err on the side of allowing fake service dogs in than keeping legitimate ones out.

14-056 Daisy (left), and her littermate 14-057 Sunshine (right), were both relinquished to *AGR* when their owner pretty much



abandoned them. The dogs were left with a neighbor when the

owner moved out of state, and after a couple of months reported he would not be coming back for them. Since the neighbor already had several dogs, she persuaded the owner to relinquish them so they could be given to us. These girls just devour any attention they receive and are very sweet. Both are 6 years old and nei-





ther had been to a vet in three years, so the vet's office was their first stop for spaying, vaccinations, and nail clipping. Both dogs

were also overweight and had apparently been eating rocks in the back yard where they essentially had lived for 6 years. We have rarely seen a pair as bonded as these girls. During a stop at Connie and Nick's house, they were always near each other, walked in step with



each other, and their tails even wagged the same way at the same time! So, it was imperative that we try hard to place these two together, and we were successful! We are so grateful that Lenna and Eric in Phoenix were happy to take them home and spoil them, making up for all their years in the back yard. Congratulations to all, and thank you, Eric and Lenna, for taking these girls and making them part of your lives.

14-058 Bracken came to us originally in 2012 as a beautiful, 7-year-old English Cream Golden. She was surrendered to us because the owner was not able to handle her extreme fear and reaction to thunder, fireworks, and balloons. She had literally run through a thick-paned living room window during a storm when the owners were not home.



Her early history indicated that she was moved back and forth across the country several times in airplanes. Does the baggage compartment sound like rolling thunder or not? To say Bracken had emotional issues was a vast understatement! In 2012, we placed her with a wonderful man who was retired and home most of the time. us by owners who had recently moved to Arizona from Missouri. There, the dogs had been living outside in a large yard. Here, they were now relegated to a postage stamp-size area. The dogs were having to be kept outside as the toddler in the family was allergic to them. The boys were only  $2\frac{1}{2}$  years old, had been purchased at six weeks of age, and then lived outdoors until now. Both dogs were fostered by Deb for a week so we could get a handle on their behavior. As you might expect, although very sweet they were completely untrained and not housebroken. They learned quickly to "go out" at Deb's, and she gave each some basic leash training. Then they were sent to Partners Dog Training School for some serious training. Like the other dogs, she had not darkened the door of a veterinary clinic for over a year, so off she

When she arrived she was nervous and scared of everything. With some work, true love and dedication she came full circle. My husband and I were not the ones that made the decision if this is her forever home, she told us it was. Thank you to all AGR members for making this lifelong connection. Happy ending all around!

14-083 Ryder was surrendered to us by an owner who felt she didn't have enough time to give him. At just less than a year old, he certainly needed lots of attention and exercise. She had not been spayed, and needed a full complement of vaccinations. At just about a year old and with her creamy coat, she was easy to place, and April and Dwight in Chandler were so excited to bring her into their home. Happy forever life, **Lola**!



14-085 Beau has one of the



more interesting stories we have had for awhile and proves the power of perseverance. He is a handsome older gentleman of about 11 who showed up as a stray in Chandler. After the finder posted flyers and craigslist ads with no takers, he was turned over to us. When we took him to the vet for his initial vetting, it was found

that he had a chip which was registered to some folks in Southern California. Unfortunately the phone number associated with the chip had been disconnected. So our efficient Sandra went one step further and contacted the vet that implanted the chip and learned the family had moved to Idaho. The vet's office happened to have a forwarding number. In the meantime, Beau had been placed with a family in Phoenix who then had to go on hold waiting to see if Beau's owners (now in Idaho) wanted him back. We finally heard back from the owners. Beau had been living in California when those folks had to move. Unfortunately a gate was left open and he disappeared. and recovery. A commitment of 10-12 weeks was quite an undertaking for folks who had never met this dog, and we appreciate greatly their desire to do so. We are wishing **Cooper**, Terri and Steve years and years of happiness together.

14-087 Shadow is probably a Border Collie/Golden Retriever mix. She was surrendered to the *Arizona Humane Society* after the death of her owner – she was found 5 days later lying next to her. Another foster failure! Her new mom updated us on "our senior sassy Shadow." She is quite the trooper and the sweetest, sassiest love you can imagine. Loyal she is, and there is no doubt Shadow was well taken care of, spoiled is more like it! When she first came to us, she won our hearts over very quickly with her charming disposition and her soft and most sweetest kisses ever that I have had from a dog. Shadow cried and whimpered a little for the first few nights we had her, we could just tell that she was missing her owner. Aside from that, Shadow always has a smile on her face and is just consistently happy-go-lucky. Overall, Shadow and our other 3 dogs got along very well from the get go, though we did discover pretty quickly that Shadow has an alpha side to her. She is kind of like all four seasons in one. She doesn't share toys nicely and has a few issues with guarding one too many things, including Michelle and me. Here is a 12-year-old senior who struggles to get up due to severe muscle atrophy, arthritis and hip issues. She is also hard of hearing and in the beginning stages of cataracts and has Cushing's disease. We started walking her as soon as we got her. She now walks up to 4 miles a day, 2 in the morning and 2 at night. She has gotten stronger through these walks and with the help of much needed feel-good meds. If by any chance we don't walk the dogs at the exact time every day, Shadow is on us like white on rice to get going! I love how much she loves to get out. Sweetness she usually is, but while out walking, Shadow will lunge and bark at any large vehicle that goes by – busses, light rail, trash truck etc... also anyone on a bike or kids riding skateboards. In a funny and cute way, one minute Shadow is so sweet, gentle and quiet and then the next minute she is all ready to kick some butt. Pretty sure Shadow is a Border Collie/Lab mix - there is nothing Golden"ish" about her. She has a very strong prey and herding drive in her. Shadow is

not an "aggressive" dog, alpha, yes, but not aggressive. I feel that Shadow's breed and her being an only dog for 12 years, the hard of hearing and not-so-good vision, contributes to the few misappropriate moments she has. We have been working lots with correcting Shadow on her not-so-good manners while out walking and her moments of too assertively stepping over boundaries she should not, especially with our Dachshund Woody. Shadow can be very stubborn, but she is learning quickly who is the pack leader in our house (the humans) and where the boundaries are. We got **Shadow** some non-slip booties and socks. We have metallic epoxy concrete floors, and Shadow has a hard time getting up and slipping on them. Took her only a few minutes or so to adjust to the socks, but she is so much happier and confident wearing them. She truly aims to please and wants nothing more than to just be free, bask in the sun, play, walk, loved on and be by Michelle's side. Shadow has grown very fond of Michelle and follows her everywhere – I often wonder if Michelle has the same type of energy and similarities as **Shadow's** previous owner did. So, our little Lambchop (nickname Michelle gave her), who decided to adopt us, has fit right into our home and hearts and blessed we are to have her. Thank you again AGR for all your wonderful support and for saving this sweet girl's life.

14-088 Oso was a stray we found on craigslist. The finder reported that he was quite expert at climbing a 6' fence so perhaps that is how he came to be a stray! At only a couple of years old, he was very well behaved on leash and was housebroken so had obviously been with a family at some point. His first order of business was being "tutored" along with the usual vaccina-



tions and tests. Carolyn and Barry swept him up and took him to their home in Phoenix where hopefully **Oso**, now named **Bob**, will learn that it is much nicer inside the fence than outside. 

# Diamonds in the Ruff By Deb Orwig

Diamonds in the Ruff are rescued dogs that require AGR to spend at least \$1,000 on their health care. We had several during the fourth quarter of 2014, a couple of which were continuing-care cases from third quarter.



**14-061 Angel** now **Sugar**, is finally in her forever home after bouncing around to two others. This 6-year-old female Golden mix was a shelter save. She required the basic medical necessities, and some suspicious lumps will be removed soon, but she seems to be otherwise healthy. Her expensive problem? Behavioral. She exhibited some "inappropriate" social skills, and these

are mainly what caused her first potential adopters to ask us to find her a different home. She was evaluated by our behavior consultant, Teryl Hall, who felt that professional training was warranted. Because we really wanted her to have a stable, permanent home environment, we sent her to *K-9 Games* in Peoria for behavior modification training. She was boarded and trained at this facility for three weeks and since discharge will be reinforcing the training once a week "for as long as it takes" with her adoptive parents, who will be trained, as well. We view behavioral intervention for some dogs as being every bit as important as medical intervention. The cost of this program was \$1,875.



14-070 Aengus, who is at least 11 years old now, has been under our care in his foster home since August. He originally came to us from the shelter in Yuma in 2010, was adopted out to a man who took good care of him until he, himself, became ill; we took Aengus back into Rescue when the man was unable to take care of him any more and eventually passed away.

Aengus had multiple problems including some suspicious lumps and bumps that had to be removed (one was a nasty-looking, open sebaceous adenoma), bad teeth that needed cleaning, and eye irritations. He was also seriously overweight. He has lost some of that extra weight now and is on pain medication for osteoarthritis. To date since he was returned to us, his vet care has cost *AGR* \$1,581.

When 11-month-old **14-082 Daisy**, now named **Trisara** (refers to the Third Level of Heaven in Sanskrit), came into Rescue she had a condition we had never seen before: hunter green poop. She was also not yet spayed and had bad ear infections. Exhaustive tests to



determine the cause of the fecal color resulted in a diagnosis of *Campylobacter*, a bacterium that lives in the gastrointestinal tract. Her spay had to be put on hold until she had had a course of antibiotic (expensive Baytril) and probiotic (Fortiflora) to clear up the poop issue. She also had to be treated with Cerenia for nausea and vomiting. While we were waiting for

all these problems to resolve, she went into heat! Her adoptive mom kept her close and safe for three weeks, and by the time she was out of heat, she was well enough recovered from everything else that the vet could proceed with the spay. We think she is finally on the way to a life of good health! Her vet bill was \$1,380.



14-086 Buddy was our big-ticket dog for the fourth quarter and actually for the entire year: \$6,264 so far. He had been found as a stray in Idaho by a miner who gave him to a friend to surrender to *AGR* because he could not afford to get Buddy's obvious lameness treated. When he came into Rescue, Buddy had grade 3 lameness in his

right leg and massive ear infections "jammed packed with brown stuff" in both ears. Turns out that his carcanial tendon or "Achilles tendon" was ruptured – it is one of three tendons in the leg. When **Buddy** walked, it collapsed. The tendon was wadded up at his knee and entangled in scar tissue. We were given two options for **Buddy**. The first option was to repair the tendon. However, the vet was worried that the tendon might not be in good enough condition to re-attach and also noted that it could stretch back out after repair; there is a 40 % chance of failure with this option. The second option was to fuse the joint and was the most definitive treatment option. In this case, Buddy would not be able to move the hock but after healing from the surgery would be able to run, play, hike, etc. The surgery involved taking the joint surface off two bones, doing a bone graft and then inserting a plate. The joint would then be fused at 10 degrees. Buddy would need to wear a cast for 10 to 12 weeks. Assured that he would not have any pain after healing from this procedure, we chose the second option, and the surgery was done on November 11th. He had a hard cast change every two weeks for 8 weeks. Then in January, he was put in a soft cast since X-rays showed he was healing well. He has had two ear lavages under anesthesia and an ear culture to determine what is growing in there – just a severe bacterial infection, which is now being treated. Buddy, now named Cooper, is making wonderful progress thanks to diligent attention by his new family in following the vet's instructions for rehabilitation.

14-092 Lucky was not a very lucky dog. He was lame on his rear

right leg when he came to us, presumably because he had been hit by a car and never treated. X-rays showed a severely dislocated hip with the femur bone jammed up into the pelvis. At that time, the vet said he needed a femoral head ostectomy and performed the FHO surgery on November 26<sup>th</sup>. Liz Tataseo, our Health Care Manager, had been through this pro-



cedure before with her own dog, **Cooper**, so she fostered **Lucky** and did his rehab for about three weeks until the family that had been approved to adopt him could take him. Unfortunately, only a couple of weeks after that, **Lucky** became extremely ill – his symptoms and blood work pointed to bone marrow cancer. There was nothing more we could do for him, so we had to make the wrenching and heartbreaking decision to have him euthanized. His bill for the relatively short time he was with us was \$4,578. We again extend our appreciation to Tram Mai and *KPNX TV Channel 12* for their very generous \$1,200 Visa gift card – that money went to help pay for **Lucky's** medical care.

14-094 Shyla was Lucky's housemate. She was in much better shape than Lucky when we got her, but her medical bills still amounted to \$1,029. She had acute moist dermatitis; she is being treated topically for that as well as being evaluated for allergies. She had several mammary masses that needed to be removed. Fortunately, they all were determined to be benign. She also had



some infected incisors worn down to the gum line, as well as some other bad teeth – a total of 10 teeth were extracted. In addition, she tested positive for valley fever with a titer of 1:8, which requires treatment with fluconazole for at least several months. **Shyla** is now on the mend and is being well cared for by her new adoptive family.





You have been seen, and when you and your special friend meet, you take him or her in your arms and embrace.


Your face is kissed again and again and again, and you look once more into the eyes of your trusting pet.



# The Financial Picture By Deb Orwig

Thanks to many and varied donation amounts given to *AGR* during the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter of 2014, we ended the year in the best financial position we have ever been in, despite some hefty veterinary bills for a few dogs (see *Diamonds in the Ruff* on pages 19-20). Most of the donations came in anonymously during our holiday gift wrapping extravaganza between November 22<sup>nd</sup> and December 24<sup>th</sup> – the 2014 holiday seaon was our best ever! But we also got a lot of donations sent to our mailbox or online through PayPal. We appreciate every single donation, from the pennies a 4-year-old pulled out of his pocket "to help the doggies" to the \$5,000 check we received from an extremely generous supporter.

Although it is, perhaps, more convenient to use PayPal, we would prefer that if you are going to make a donation to send a check. The main reason is that checks cost us nothing to deposit. PayPal costs us about 3% per transaction, but we do not add that 3% to a donation, only to a purchase (such as a membership or for merchandise like calendars). So, in actuality, a donation made through PayPal gives us 3% less than you might have intended. For example, a \$10 donation will actually give us \$9.70; a \$250 donation will actually give us \$242.50; a \$1000 donation will give us \$970. The deducted amounts may not seem like much when viewed individually, but collectively we have "lost" considerable dollars due to PayPal's transaction charge.

The same would be the case if you called us and gave us your credit card information – to protect your own security, please do not ever send us credit card information in an e-mail! We get charged about 3% for any charge from a Visa, Mastercard, Discover or American Express card – and it does not matter whether that charge is through a debit or a credit card, it is still 3%. Although I do impose a 3% "convenience fee" for using a credit card for a purchase, I will not add 3% to a donation – it is just not the right thing to do when someone wants to be generous. In the future though, if you are considering giving us a donation, please make it in the form of a check if at all possible.

#### A Note About Donation Acknowledgment Letters

Every cash and item donation that was given to *AGR* during 2014 was acknowledged – or, should I say I tried to acknowledge every one. A couple of people contacted me after they got their letters to tell me I either had the donation amount incorrect or I had left out one of their donations. I appreciated the contact, and I immediately issued a corrected letter. I sent out well over 700 letters altogether, so I hope all the other letters were accurate. If you make a donation during 2015, please be assured that you will get a letter of acknowledgment but most likely not until January 2016.

## Book Review By Jude Fulghum

The Mountaintop School for Dogs and Other Second Chances By Ellen Clooney, ISBN# 0544236157, 2014

Evie is a 24-year-old young lady with a past. While going through rehab (drugs, along with an emotionally vague past), she comes across an ad for a dog trainer at a Sanctuary high in the mountains. Although she has no experience training dogs, she fudges her application and is accepted. Carrying lots of books about dog breeds and training methods with her, she quickly comes to realize that working with severely abused Rescue dogs is nothing like the books she has read (or more likely, skimmed). These are not purebred dogs learning to sit and stay; these are dogs kept in cellars, raced on tracks in Florida, dogs not wanting to be touched, and other typical Rescue situations. The Sanctuary not only takes in Rescue dogs, but participates in underground railroad type activities such as the kidnapping of dogs in need, including a large roundup of Pit Bulls from a dogfighting situation. "Rescued dogs are dogs in rehab" is an appropriate description of the types of dogs arriving at the Sanctuary. And what could possibly be a more fitting character than the chief "greeter" at the Sanctuary being an old Golden Retriever who has been adopted several times but returned for the usual stupid-person reasons and who takes his job as Sanctuary Host very seriously. For me, she went from absolute novice to pretty much of a "dog whisperer" in way too few pages, but there are some real gems in this book. This is a good read for people who perhaps don't understand all the situations a Rescue group encounters when evaluating dogs to come into its program. There are some good insights about appropriate methods of working with difficult dogs and reading a dog's cues. Definitely worth recommending. There was one particular quote that said to me what Rescue is all about: "Everything that happened to you before is over." Might be my new statement to dogs that I transport.



#### PACC 911 Adopt-a-Thon on 11-15-14 By Deb Orwig

For those of you who do not know, **PACC 911** stands for **Phoenix** Animal Care Coalition. This group of volunteers serves as sort of an umbrella organization over the various rescue groups that are active in the Phoenix Metro area. Several times during the cooler months of the year (October through March), *PACC 911* sponsors Adopt-a-Thons. At these events, many of the Rescue groups that attend (there are usually 40 to 80, depending on the location), do on-the-spot adoptions. may request funding - AGR received \$1,300 from the EMF in 2014. There is no cost for **AGR** to belong to **PACC 911**, only an obligation to attend at least three

of their events during the year (in 2014, we went to five). Rescues are never charged a booth fee at one of these events either, so any revenue we take in at a PACC 911 event is totally ours. We thank **PACC 911** for all the fundraising and public information opportunities they have provided!
